I reckon wee incampt last mo monday night one mile up</p> <p>from col popes regimint ____ was in aur camp that night but I did not get to see him as I am in hast I will bring my leter to a close giv my respects to all who may inquire after me write soon give me all of the nuse write me along leter dyrect your letter to Col W. C. Whitakers six Ky regiment Sam Woods brigade car of capt R. Lee yours. Amos G Mount write soon giv my love to all</p> <p>tell uncle Jim that I would like to get one leter from him eny how</p>	<p>6th Regiment left Sigel on Dec 30th for Camp Norton in Bardstown. At Camp Norton they met up with three other Indiana regiments and marched 21 miles south to Camp Wickliffe in Larue County. Despite Mount's description, others described the trek as long and tedious with bad weather.
